The annual contest, run by the DNR Division of Historic Preservation & Archaeology (DHPA), has been held since 2005 to promote Indiana's historic resources. subjects of photos must be at least 50 years old, in Indiana, and must include man-made designed elements. Photos of exclusively natural elements will not accepted.

Photos can be black and white or color and must have been taken within the last two years. Each photographer may enter up to three images, and an entry form is required for each photo. Images should be emailed to aborland@dnr.IN.gov and must be JPEG files that are 10mb or smaller. Participants will only be able to send one photo and one entry form per email.

For complete rules and guidelines and for required entry form, see dnr.IN.gov/historic/2800.htm. The contest deadline is April 2.

Follow the DNR Instagram account (@indianadnr) in May. DHPA will be taking over for a week and featuring selected photos along with contest winners.

HELPFUL TIPS FOR **SELECTING YOUR TAX** PREPARER - KNOW WHAT To Look For

With individual income tax season just around the corner, the Indiana Department of Revenue (DOR) wants to help Hoosiers feel confident in who they partner with to prepare and submit their tax required to file federal tax returns.

"Paying for professional services to prepare a tax makes return is a very common practice and can help many Hoosiers during tax season," advised DOR Commissioner Bob Grennes. "There are many tax professionals that will provide quality advice and service. Taking a few simple steps will help you hire one who will serve you

DOR offers several tips on choosing a tax preparer:

Confirm the preparer's service fee before the return is prepared. Avoid preparers who base their fee on the expected refund amount.

Ask the preparer for references and check their professional credentials. Ask friends or family who have previously used the preparer if they were satisfied with the services provided.

Check to see if the preparer has any complaints with the Better Business Bureau, the for CPAs or the state's bar added association for attorneys.

professional organization that holds members accountable to a code of ethics and requires members continuing pursue education.

Ask if the preparer has a valid Preparer Identification Number (PTIN) from the Internal Revenue Service (IRS), which has been returns since 2011.

Avoid any preparer who overly optimistic claims about obtaining a larger refund over other preparers, especially if they have not fully reviewed your tax documents.

Take time to fully review all documents and ask questions before signing the return. Avoid tax preparers who ask you to sign blank tax forms. Remember, the individual whose name is on the tax return is who is legally responsible for what is included, even if the return is prepared or completed by a third-party.

Use a tax professional who provides a copy of the completed return to the you for your records.

"A reputable tax preparer will ask multiple questions to determine which deductions or credits you may qualify for, and instruct you to keep careful and complete records to confirm the information state's board of accountancy contained on your tax return," Commissioner Grennes. Kudos, Kicks & Karats



This week is catch up week on the year end books for the cemetery and the personnel household. Tax time is right around the corner and life gets really busy. So I like those prep and throw in the oven and forget recipes and just when I forget, the smell from the oven starts to fill the house and it smells so good. Unless I really forget and the smell starts to go hand in hand with the smoke detector. Lol Hey, I'm honest I've burnt supper a few times to many, but we choke it down. Just another reason for a midnight snack later.

My favorite winter time recipes are those that are cooked in the oven. It helps heat the house and like I said the aroma of the cooking item and the one pot meals are great especially when I'm busy. In the winter we all need some comfort food. It just makes the winter blues a little easier to handle. So I have a favorite recipe that can be served as a week night meal, but can also be served as a Sunday noon meal for when the kids or extended family are visiting. I've probably shared this recipe before in my mom's column back a few years ago, but it's a goodie and will share again.

Herbed rump roast or pot roast

3 to 4 # rump roast or chuck roast 1 tsp. marjoram 2 tbsp. oil 1 tsp. thyme 1c. chopped onions 1 bay leaf 1 tsp. beef bouillon or 2 cubes 1 clove garlic

In a skillet brown roast in oil on all sides of meat. Place in a oven safe pan and add the herbs, onions, garlic and about 2 to 3 c. of water and the bouillon. Roast till the meat is done to your liking. I say this cause some like it well done some don't, in this house we are medium to medium rare on beef. But it really depends how much time you want it to cook, slow cook of 250 for 3 to 4 hours or 350 for approx. 1 hour. If its getting too brown, tent it with foil to keep from over browning.

There is a 2nd part to this recipe that creates a pot roast. Add potatoes, more onions if you like, whole baby carrots, and chunked celery, to the roast before placing in the oven. When I do the pot roast I usually get out the blue granite roaster and put it all together in it and cover with the lid. Remember to remove the bay leaf so no one eats it.

I like to serve the pot roast with dinner rolls and a dessert. If you are just making the rump roast, there is many things that go with it as far as a side. Mashed potatoes, roasted red potatoes, and just about any vegetable you can think of would go good. Get creative. I'm sure if it sounds good when your making the sides, I'm sure it will be. Enjoy.

PRE-RETIREES: PLAN NOW FOR HEALTH CARE COSTS

If you're close to retirement, you'll have several financial issues to consider. But you'll want to pay attention to one of the most important of these issues: health care costs. How can you prepare yourself for these expenses?

First, get an early start on estimating health care costs. More than two-thirds of those planning to retire in the next 10 years say they have no idea what their health and long-term care costs will be in retirement, according to the Edward Jones/Age Wave Four Pillars of the New Retirement study. And some people don't worry much about these costs, which may be considerable, thinking that Medicare will pay for most of them.

While Medicare does cover many medical expenses, it also has its own costs. You probably won't pay premium for Part (inpatient/hospital coverage), since you likely had this cost deducted from your paycheck when you were working. But if you are hospitalized, you'll have to pay deductibles and coinsurance (the percentage of costs you pay after you've paid your deductible). Part B (doctor's visits) requires a premium, deducted from your Social Security checks, and you must pay an out-ofpocket deductible. After you meet this deductible for the year, you typically pay 20% of Medicare-approved amount for most doctor's services. And when you enroll in Part D (prescription drug plan), you will likely also have to pay a monthly premium, annual an deductible and coinsurance or copays.

To help pay for the Medicare deductible, coinsurance and copayments, you may want




