IDEAS FOR THANKING YOUR FAMILY

It's almost Thanksgiving. And although 2020 may have been a difficult year for you, as it has been for many people, you can probably still find things for which you can be thankful – such as your family. How can you show your appreciation for your loved ones?

Here are a few suggestions:

Invest in your children's future. If you have young children – or even grandchildren – one of the greatest gifts you can give them is the gift of education. You may want to consider contributing to a higher education funding vehicle.

Be generous. Do you have older children, just starting out in life? If so, they could well use a financial gift to help pay off student loans, buy a car or even make a down payment on a home. You can give up to \$15,000 per year, per recipient, without incurring gift taxes. THIS HOLIDAY SEASON, **DOCTORS URGE PUBLIC TO** MAKE SAFETY A TOP

(StatePoint) With COVID-19 infections at an all-time high, medical experts urge the public to make safety their outdoor activities that can number priority one throughout the holiday season.
