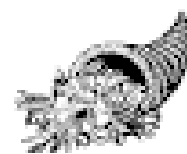

GIVE THANKS

While Thanksgiving signals the start of the holiday season, it also presents a unique opportunity for individuals to give thanks and give back by donating blood.

"Giving the gift of life is a great way to demonstrate your thankfulness and give back to others," said Sharyn Whitman, CEO for the Indiana-Ohio Blood Services Region of the American Red Cross. "At the American Red Cross, we're thankful for every person who steps forward to help save lives through the simple act of rolling up their sleeve."

The need for blood remains constant during the holiday season as travel and other activities can make it difficult for some donors to find time to give. Plus, the demand for blood can expand as roadway accidents increase the need for blood to be available on a moment's notice. A person seriously injured in a car accident can sometimes need 40 or more units of blood to save their life.

Blood, too, is needed daily by people undergoing immediate or ongoing treatments for cancer or other serious diseases like Sickle Cell. And while all blood types are needed, the demand for type O is great since type O blood can be transfused to patients with other blood types like A, B and AB.

"The demand for blood never goes away," said Whitman. "Regardless of the season, hospitals and their patients always need blood."

How to Donate Blood - Individuals who are at least 17 years old (16 with parental permission in Indiana and Ohio), meet height and weight requirements (at least 110 pounds based on height) and are in general good health may be eligible to donate blood. Red Cross donor card or positive ID required. Call 1-800-GIVE LIFE (1-800-448-3543) or log on RedCrossBlood.org for more information.

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

MY TOWN and Yours BY DENNIS STROUD

One of Warren's finest opened on February 28, 1893. The building was a fine two story brick building, on Wayne Street, where most of us would remember as the Masonic Lodge. Hotel Warren was well arranged, well lighted and well managed. The building, on the inside, was finished in light wood

and the halls, parlors and bedrooms were well fitted for use, lighted and heated with gas. The halls and stairways were elegantly carpeted with Brussels carpet and every convenience that made a hotel just as it should be was there.

The grand opening was a grand success. Early in the evening the guests began coming in and by eight o'clock the office, parlors and halls were filled with over a hundred guests from the town and vicinity. When dinner was announced, twenty-four couples, who had purchased tickets earlier, marched from the parlors to the dining room and were seated at the finest tables ever seen, at that time, in Warren.

The dinner consisted of three courses as follows; the first course was tropical fruits and lemonade. For the second course cold meats, cranberries, salads and coffee were served. Then ice cream and cake finished up the meal. The Toastmaster was Dr. C.H. Good. Others that gave speeches were: Dr. F.M. Wall, Fred Swaim, L.L. Simons, Dr. J.S. Sprowl, F.M. Huff and J.W. Surran.

By nine o'clock members of the Warren dancing club, in full evening dress, went to the Opera House, which was brilliantly lighted and handsomely decorated. Some thirty couples formed for the grand march and were led by Miss L.B. McCollum and Mr. Keepers. From every point of view the ball was a success and a most enjoyable affair. Some of the dances on the program were as follows; Marche, Waltz, Quadrille, Polka, Schottische, Oxford Minuet and Bon Ton. For the many pleasures of the entire evening the devotees of the "light fantastic" were indebted to Mr. and Mrs. G. W. Stites, of the Hotel Warren. Hotel Warren's life came to an end when the furnishings were sold to a Kokomo wrecking firm in 1907.

DISPOSING OF CARCASSES

With deer firearms season starting Nov. 14, hunters, if they are successful, need to be aware of the proper way to dispose of deer carcasses once the meat has been removed.

"A hunter's responsibility, both ethically and legally, doesn't end until the carcass is disposed of properly," said Lt. Mark Farmer, public information officer for the DNR Division of Law Enforcement.

Professional meat processors have legal means of disposing of carcasses. Successful hunters who do not use professional processors have a few different options for proper carcass disposal, according to the Indiana State Board of Animal Health (BOAH).

One is to check to see if a local processor will dispose of the carcass. If so, there will likely be a charge for pickup. The hunter cannot take the carcass into the processing facility.

Another option is to contact a renderer to ask about pickup/drop off. BOAH's list of renderer contact information is at <http://www.in.gov/boah/2368.htm>.

Landfills meet BOAH's standard, but hunters should check with the landfill first to see if it accepts carcasses and if it has bagging requirements.

Indiana conservation officers will be stepping up enforcement of illegal dumping laws using electronic monitoring equipment.

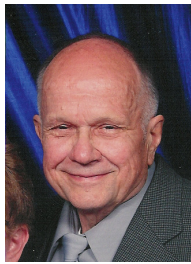

HUNTER SAFETY

With Indiana's deer firearms season opening Saturday, the state's conservation officers remind hunters of these safety tips to prevent hunting accidents.

- Treat every firearm with the same respect due a loaded firearm.

- Control the direction of your firearm's muzzle. Carry your firearm safely, keeping the safety on until ready to shoot. Keep your finger off the trigger until ready to shoot.

- Identify your target and what's beyond it. Know the identifying features of the game you hunt.

- Be sure the barrel and action are clear of obstructions and that you have only ammunition of the proper size for the firearms you are carrying.

- Unload firearms when not in use. Leave the actions open. Firearms should be carried unloaded when traveling to and from shooting areas.

- Never point a firearm at anything you do not want to shoot. Avoid all horseplay with a firearm.

- Never climb a fence or tree, or jump a ditch or log with a loaded firearm. Never pull a firearm toward you by the muzzle.

- Never shoot a bullet at a flat, hard surface or water. During target practice, be sure your backstop is adequate.

- Store firearms and ammunition separately, beyond the reach of children and careless adults.

- Avoid alcoholic beverages or other mood-altering drugs before and while hunting or shooting.

These tips form a basic foundation for good firearms safety. Following them significantly increases the chances for an accident-free hunt.

In addition, to following the tips about firearms, hunters using elevated tree stands or platforms should use a full-body safety harness to protect themselves in case of a fall. Falling from an elevated stand or platform is the most common hunting accident in Indiana.

During the 2008 hunting season, 24 hunting accidents were reported to conservation officers. Falls from tree stands led to 15 injuries, resulting in two deaths.

add to the loam next spring. Seems for only having one tree we collect a lot of leaves some of which are strays.

The plants I put in the greenhouse are doing well and some blooming. Last time I mentioned about my "ghost cactus" it is in full bloom and is very pretty, very white except for some light pink in the center of the blooms. This was supposed to be red, in Texas maybe it was the red clay soil that gave it the color, good Hoosier soil did something to it but I still enjoy it.

Now it is time to start thinking about the holidays and the preparations. Also coming up is the annual craft show, November 21 and the vendors from the farmers market will be there for their winter market also. So mark your calendars and join in the fun and also the vendors hope to be able to help you with the holiday shopping.

Most people think of their holiday dinner based around turkey. At home we never had turkey since we raised chickens it was chicken every Sunday and holidays. A few times dad brought home from work a ham at Christmas, a gift from the employer. That was a real treat. No matter what we had mom always made a very special meal from it. I learned early on that you can make a lot of good things from left over chicken. (If there was any).

One thing she fixed was cream chicken served over cornbread. That was my favorite. She served it with mashed potatoes and home canned green beans.

The recipe which she had is like this: She took about a quart of broth or maybe more depending on how many were home to eat. Heat it and very slowly add a mix of 3 beaten eggs and about 1 tablespoon corn starch to the broth, when it thickened she added cut up chicken and let it slowly cook a few minutes to heat the chicken well. Added salt and pepper to taste. Her cornbread recipe was 1 cup sifted flour, 2 teaspoon baking powder, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 tablespoon sugar, 1 cup

yellow cornmeal, 2 eggs beaten, 3/4 cup milk, 4 tablespoons melted shortening (which I use vegetable oil). Blend the flour, salt, sugar and baking powder add cornmeal and mix well, combine eggs, milk and add to flour, last add the oil or melted shortening stir only to blend do not over blend. Turn into a greased 9x9 pan bake 375

degrees about 25-30 minutes.

This recipe of hers is from one of her cookbooks and is so old and the pages tearing and brittle so I have framed it and hangs in my kitchen. Thus preserving another memory.

Enjoy autumn and the holiday time coming up.

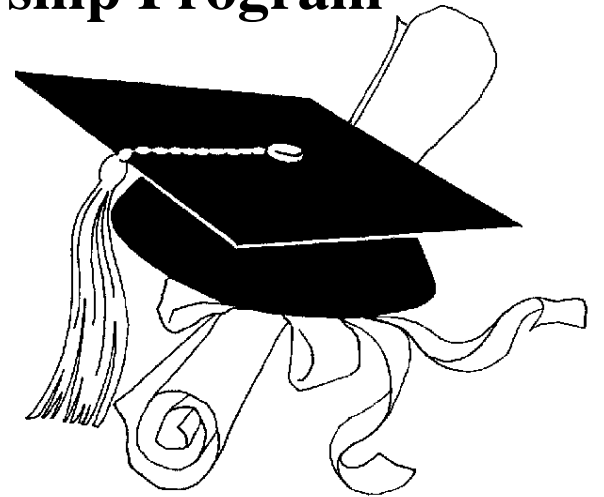
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
