CROP GROWER DECISIONS INFLUENCED BY MANY

FACTORS

Field operations including tilling ground, applying fertilizer and spraying herbicides have been moving forward this spring. Farmers are studying the 10 day weather outlook and beyond to see if the weather after Easter will be suitable to plant corn and soybeans.

Crop growers are asking themselves many questions. They may be wondering "What if we have a damp and cold spell in April?" or "Should I go ahead and plantsoybeans in early April if conditions are right?"

Specialists were cautioning farmers in mid-March that herbicides were possibly being applied too soon. As Bill Johnson, Purdue Extension weed specialist said, "We normally start our planting operations in the middle of April, but with all the fieldwork being done right now we're running 2-4 weeks ahead of schedule," he said. "That means that we're potentially adding one month onto the growing season. And for producers using what we call reduced or setup herbicide rates, they may find their herbicide programs running out 2-4 weeks early as well."

While there's nothing wrong with early tillage, Tony Vyn, Purdue Extension agronomist, said producers need to think ahead and not increase the total number of passes they're making across their fields.

"From the soil, fuel and time conservation points of view, early tillage operations need to be considered as candidates for the final tillage operations farmers complete," he said. "It's important not to till now and then do it again later before planting. That means that when farmers are ready to plant, they should consider using a stale seedbed approach."


Vyn also said that with long time gaps between tillage and planting, it is important to avoid the risks of excessive seedbed moisture loss if dry conditions prevail.

Another factor for farmers to consider with early planting is the field history. Kiersten Wise, a Purdue Extension plant pathologist, noted that disease development is mostly dictated by environment, planting date and seed variety. Wise said there could be more problems after a very warm, wet winter because soil-borne diseases are there and waiting for the right conditions to flourish

"Soil diseases don't go away, so growers need to plan to manage them," she said. "Knowing the field history can help growers choose varieties

WHAT TO DO

"Rescuing" an injured or apparently abandoned baby wild animal may do the opposite

of what you seek to accomplish, and break the law.

This time of year, thousands of animals are born in the wild. With the spread of suburban areas into their natural habitats, young animals are increasingly bornnear humans, who are more apt to discover them without an adult animal nearby. When this happens, a few reminders are especially pertinent.

While some baby animals may be orphaned or abandoned, that's not always true.

Picking up a baby animal that is not orphaned or abandoned is notonly usually unnecessary, but also can be bad for the animal. It's also illegal if you don't have the proper permit or take the animal straight to a licensed wildlife rehabilitator.

Such animals also pose safety and health risks for humans. They may look helpless, cute and cuddly, but they can bite or scratch people who attempt to handle them. Some wild animals carry parasites and infectious diseases, some of which can be transmitted to humans.

"The apparent lack of an adult does not mean a young animal is orphaned," said Linnea Petercheff, operations staff specialist for the DNR Division of Fish & Wildlife. "Adults often leave their young alone, safe in nests or dens, while they forage for food, but rarely do they abandon their young.'

If a bird has fallen out of a nest, it is OK to gently return it to the nest. The best way to make sure an animal is truly orphaned is to wait and check it periodically. If you are unsure, place some strings or sticks across the nest. Place some grass across the top of a rabbit nest that is found with young in it.

If such items are later disturbed, the mother has probably returned. In such a situation, leave the young animal alone. The adult will return after you leave the area. As an example, rabbits often come to the nest to feed their young only a couple of times a dav.

The best way to make sure that a fawn that appears to be alone is truly orphaned is to wait and checkit periodically. Before taking any action, remember the following:

-Call a licensed wild animal rehabilitator; find the list bygoing to the DNR website, wildlife.IN.gov and click on "Wildlife Rehabilitation."

-Leave the fawn alone and its mother will probably come and get it. Deer can take better care of their young than a human can.

-Human scent on the fawn will not prevent the mother from taking care of it.

-If you do not see any deer nearby, have someone watch the fawn without being seen by the mother. In most cases, the mother will come back and get the fawn after you leave the area.

If you believe the mother has not returned to a nest or a deer has not come back to feed her fawn, or you know that the mother is no longeralive call a licensed wildlife rehabilitatorlisted at: dnr.IN.gov/ fishwild/5492.htm.

Remember, state laws prohibit keeping protected wild animals without a permit. Most species of wildlife are protected by law and cannot be kept as a pet. Federal laws also prohibit possession of migratory birds, including songbirds, raptors and waterfowl. It is even illegal to treat wild animals for sickness or injury without a permit.

Wild animal rehabilitation permits are issued to qualified individuals who take in sick, injured, or orphaned wild animals with the intent of releasing them back into the wild.

If you encounter an injured, truly abandoned or sick wild animal, do one of the following for assistance:

-Call a licensed wild animal rehabilitator; find the list bygoing the DNR website, wildlife.IN.gov and click on "Wildlife Rehabilitation."

-Call the DNR Division of Fish & Wildlife in Indianapolis, (317) 232-

-Call your DNR lawenforcement district headquarters or regional headquarters; contact information is at: dnr.IN.gov/ lawenfor/2755.htm.

-Call a licensed veterinarian for immediate assistance with a sick or severely injured wild animal.



SAFE TURKEY SEASON

Indiana Conservation Officers are encouraging hunters to be safe this spring when taking to the woods. Turkey hunting is a sport that has been enjoyed by Hoosiers for more than three decades. During this time, Indiana has never had a fatal turkey hunting accident; however, a few turkey hunters are injured in shooting accidents every year.

The 2012 spring turkey season opens April 25th and runs through May 13th. The youth spring turkey season is April 21-22. Hunters are allowed to take 1 male or bearded turkey during the regular spring season or during the youth season. Youth hunters who take a turkey during the youth weekend are not allowed to take another turkey in the regular spring season. The 2012 Spring & Fall Turkey Hunting Guide can be viewed online at http:// www.in.gov/dnr/fishwild/files/ fw-turkeyhuntguide.pdf.

Indiana Conservation officers offer these safety TIPS for you to follow while turkey hunting.

- · Whistle or shout to alert approaching hunters of your position.
- · Never wave or stand up.
- · Never sneak in on a turkey or use a gobbler call near other hunters.
- · Never crowd another hunter working a bird.
- \cdot Never shoot at sound or movement.
- \cdot Be extremely careful using turkey decoys.
- · Do not wear red, white, or blue outer wear or exposed inner clothing.
- · Don't assume you are the only hunter in the area.
- \cdot Be certain of a hunting partner's location.
- · Know and identify your target and what is beyond.
- · Always keep your gun pointed in a safe direction.
- \cdot Always keep your finger off the trigger until ready to shoot.
- Never use alcohol or drugs before or while hunting.

 Despect property rights and
- \cdot Respect property rights and secure permission before hunting.
- · Hunters should unload their guns when crossing fences, climbing into stands, jumping ditches or traversing steep ravines.

During this season, many people are also in the woods searching for wild mushrooms.

Before partaking in this seasonal activity, obtain permission from the landowner and ask if anyone has permission to Turkey Hunt in the woods you will be in. Even if you are the only person allowed to be in the woods, never assume youareoutherealone. Amistake in property boundaries or trespassers could put you in the woods with a Turkey Hunter. If youare hunting on state property's regulations for permitted activities and times.

Whetheryou are turkey hunting, mushroom hunting or enjoying a spring walk in the woods, be on the lookout for suspicious activity. Things you may come across include baited areas, marijuana grows, and methamphetamine activity.

Anyone with information regarding any suspicious activity or fish and wildlife violations are urged to contact Indiana Conservation Officer's Central Dispatch at 812-837-9536. Conservation Officers can also be contacted at any Conservation Officers District Headquarters which can be found online in the "contact us" portion of the DNR Law Enforcement website www.in.gov/dnr/lawenfor/. Fish and wildlife violations can be reported by calling 800-TIP-IDNR or on the TIP website www.1800tipidnr.org. Callers can remain anonymous and are subject to a reward if information leads to a conviction.

WEIRD **T**REES

All Hoosiers should still be on the lookout for suspicious-looking trees.

Information about these freaks of the forest is wanted by the DNR Division of Forestry in connection with the 2012 "Invasion of the Weird Trees."

"Invasion of the Weird Trees" is an online publication that identifies the weirdest trees for each county based on submissions from the public. The publication is updated every four years.

Submissions can be any species and size. The only requirement is that they be weird and be a living tree

Past entries in "Invasion of the WeirdTrees" have included trees that swallowed signs, trees grown together like conjoined twins, trees with trunks twisted like a snail shell and trees that resemble giant octopuses.

The forestry division has received dozens of submissions for this

year's update. As the April 30 deadline for submissions approaches, forestry officials want to make sure all weird trees are rounded up.

To submit a tree, email your name, address, phone number, and specific location of the tree, including county to scarman@dnr.IN.gov.Toenterby mail, submit nonreturnable photographs and the same information to Sam Carman, Division of Forestry, 402 W. Washington St., Rm. W296, Indianapolis, IN 46204.

Based upon your photos, district foresters will narrow down the field to the weir dest tree for each county. The 2012 "Invasion of the Weird Trees" should be available online in the fall.

ONE BUCK RULE

The Natural Resources Commission will conduct a public hearing May 3 in Plainfield on a proposal to continue the one-buck deer hunting rule.

The one-buck rule currently allows only one antlered deer to be taken during the special youth, archery, firearm, or muzzleloader seasons combined. The rule is set to expire Sept. 1.
