The Warren Town Council has rescheduled the Regular December Meeting to Wednesday, December 18th at 5:00 pm in the Council Meeting Room of Assembly Hall, 131 N. Wayne St. A regular agenda schedule will be followed.

GARDENER TRAINING

Purdue Master Gardener intern training will be at the Huntington County Courthouse Annex on Monday and Thursday evenings from 6:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m. starting February 10 and ending April 16. There will be a wide range of subjects covered in the training including soil and plant science, diagnosis of plant problems, pesticide safety, and culture of vegetable, flower, landscape, and fruit plants. The deadline for submitting applications is January 31.

There are many projects, in which individuals can volunteer, once they have completed the Master Gardener intern coursework.

Some examples are providing gardening education at community events, teaching youth, and speaking to local clubs and organizations. Huntington County Master Gardeners also spend many hours working at display gardens at the Salamonie Interpretive Center and the Forks of the Wabash.

Many more possibilities for volunteer service exist for those willing to help teach others through

their knowledge of taking the class.

If you'd like an application for the 2020 class or if you have questions about the program, contact Ed Farris, Agriculture and Natural Resource Educator, Purdue Extension – Huntington County Office, 1340 S Jefferson, Huntington by calling 260-358-4826 or by e-mail: emfarris@purdue.edu.

Note that class size may be limited depending on the number of applications that are received. Materials and expenses for the series of classes cost \$150 per participant.

MENTAL HEALTH FIRST AID TRAINING

On December 10, 2019, Purdue Extension will offer Adult Mental Health First Aid training at the Wells County Community Center, 1240 4-H Park Road, Bluffton, IN 46714 from 8:00 AM – 5:30 PM. This

groundbreaking eight-hour training course gives people the tools to identify when someone is struggling with a mental health or substance use problem, and to connect them with appropriate support and resources when necessary. The Mental Health First Aid program is open to any adult. Cost is \$20 per person and includes lunch and workbook.

One in five Americans has a mental health condition, but many are reluctant to seek help or may not know where to turn for care. Unlike physical conditions, mental health and substance use issues can be difficult to detect. For friends and family members, it can be hard to know when and how to step in. As a result, those in need of mental health services often do not get them until it is too late.

Just as CPR helps those without clinical training assist an individual having a heart attack, Mental Health First Aid prepares participants to interact with a person experiencing a mental health crisis. Mental Health First Aiders learn a 5-step action plan that guides them through the process of reaching out and offering appropriate support until professional help is available.

"Through this program, we hope to take the fear and hesitation out of starting conversations about mental health and substance use

problems," says Linda Rosenberg President and CEO of the National Council for Behavioral Health, which helped bring Mental Health First Aid to the U.S. in 2008. "When more people are equipped with the tools they need to start a dialogue, more people can get the help they may need."

In just ten years, Mental Health First Aid has become a full-blown movement in the United States—more than 1 million people are certified Mental Health First Aiders, and that number grows every day.

ICE CREAM MYSTERY TRIP

The bus departed Victor, NY at 7am and headed west on I-90, naturally. It was sunny and clear but the speed limit on the interstate highway was only 65mph.

Our driver avoided the exit to Buffalo and Canada. It's a good thing, as I only had a copy of my passport! Once again the bus passed through the Lackawanna Toll Booth, westbound this time. It is 8:15am and still 65 miles from Pennsylvania.

The bus stopped at an interstate oasis that required crossing the highway to reach the restrooms. No, we luckily did not have to dodge traffic to reach the necessary. There was an overhead, covered walkway. No one got injured.

After rejoining the western flow of traffic, the route paralleled the Southern Railway for a while. How can it be named, Southern when it is this far north? Anyway,

we entered Pennsylvania at 9:35am and its 65mph limit. The bus crossed the Ohio state line at 10:15am. We were making progress.

While traveling through Ohio before lunch, I read a small book titled, "A Lady in the Lake." A lady disappeared from a boat in Lake Placid in 1933. She was never located then. At that time divers could only submerge 50 feet deep. In 1963 at a depth of 105 feet, two divers discovered what they thought was a mannequin in the lake bed.

They quickly realized that it was a human body. It was completely intact and featured a wax-like exterior. The question remains, was it suicide or something else?

There was a rope and an anchor still attached. The authorities and the pathologist determined that the body was female and probably the missing Anna Mabel Smith Douglas (1877-1933).

We stopped for lunch at 12 noon just off I-80 for safety reasons! My parents told me to never play in traffic! Left-overs were our menu. These items were confiscated from our last breakfast at the Mirror Lake Inn in Lake Placid. It consisted of toast with peanut butter, apple, banana and Victor, NY water.

We sat outside in the sun for the lunch break. Our warm seats were close to three, white flagpoles standing near the entrance of the building. The American Flag was attached at the top of the middle pole, which was the tallest. The Ohio State Flag was hanging from the second tallest pole to the left side. An unidentified white flag with a green and white, round emblem was fastened to the third and shortest pole on the right side. To add to this ensemble was an additional flag positioned below the American Flag. It was black,

in majority, with white, descriptive lettering of POW-MIA. Patriotism is alive and well!

The tour director filled part of our afternoon travel time with the movie, "Miracle on Ice." It is the story about the U.S.1980 Olympic hockey team that surprisingly beat Russia 4-3 and Finland 3-1 to win the Gold Medal at Lake Placid.

In western Ohio, most wheat fields had been harvested since we left six days earlier. A few corn stalks had tasseled, but most fields had not been that fortunate.

The bus returned us to our vehicles in Fort Wayne at 5:30pm.

DON'T LET THE HOLIDAY SEASON GET THE BEST OF YOU
